Lockdown account

As part of a writing task set by Mr Potter, pupils told us about their feelings towards lockdown.

"The first and second week of lockdown I missed all of my school friends and learning in school. I also missed all of my teachers. When I first heard about lockdown I thought it would only be for a few weeks, but no. As months and months went on it got a little easier and I was used to the work and staying at home. Now that I know we will be going back and that I will see my friends, I am excited." - Rio

"The year 2020 was an extremely difficult year for us all. It started well after Christmas with our new toys and gadgets. This all changed at the beginning of March when a very strange virus appeared affecting the whole world. All of our school work was done online through a website called Purple Mash and teachers called weekly to see how we were doing or if we needed help with our school work. Finally after months of staying indoors, on the 1st June 2020, we were able to visit our families of up to six people, keeping the two metre distance rule and some children started to return to school." -Kaiden

"We are allowed to go out for daily exercise, I go on my scooter keeping two metres away from the people who pass me. We have to wash our hands and use hand sanitizer. I do enjoy doing schoolwork but I miss my friends and teachers. I have been wondering who my new teacher will be in September and what the classrooms will look like.
